I BOUGHT A FUSION

y daily driver Toyota was 15 years old with close to 219,000 miles on it, so we decided to trade it in, for another car, in addition to my Mustang. At first, I considered buying a new Ford Escape and started looking into them, but another SUV was not what I truly wanted, so I passed on that. So, what to pursue next? I wanted my next car to be another Ford. Ten to fifteen years ago I test drove one or two new Ford Fusions at about the same time I was looking into buying another Mustang. I was very impressed with the Fusions, but I wanted another Mustang and went that route instead. But I remember saying to myself that if the Mustangs never existed, I would buy a Fusion instead. So here today in 2022, I decided to look at a Ford Fusion.

This was a great idea, except that they were out of production since 2020! On April 19, I started researching the Fusions on several websites. All I knew about them was that they looked great, were comfortable and drove well. After that it was time to start doing my homework! The Wikipedia Ford Fusion (Americas) article said that the Fusion was a 4-door sedan that was the successor to the Ford Contour. Ford assembled the Fusion from 2006 to 2020, with two generations over the years, and various gasoline and hybrid engine versions. They were assembled as either front-wheel drive or all-wheel drive cars. The Fusions were built at Ford's Hermosillo plant in Sonora, Mexico. Production began on August 1, 2005 as a 2006 year model. The Fusion was considered a mid-size car between the smaller Focus and the full-size Taurus. The Fusion was also sold in other countries beyond the United States, with some using the name of Ford Mondeo instead.

The first generation Fusions were assembled from 2005 through 2012. They were based upon the Ford CD3 platform, which was actually Mazda's G platform, that was shared with the Mazda 6, Lincoln MKZ and Mercury Milan. The Fusion went through many upgrades and refreshes over the years, until the second generation Fusions were unveiled in 2012 as 2013 models. These latest Fusions used the Ford CD4 platform instead, resulting in a slightly larger sedan. Production continued at the Hermosillo plant, but strong sales required that



additional capacity was added for several years at the Flat Rock, Michigan location.

	The
Fusion	was
available	in



several models over the years, such as the S, SE, SEL, Titanium, Hybrid, Sport, Platinum and Energi. There were also six different engines offered between 2013 and 2020. Two were Duratec I4 gasoline engines, and the others were Ecoboost Turbocharged I4 or V6 motors. Based upon what I reviewed, I decided that I wanted to find a Fusion with a Duratec 25 I4, which was a 2.5L (152 CID) engine, developing 175hp at 6000 RPM. It produced 175 ft-lb of torque, and was coupled to a 6-speed automatic transmission rated at 21/32/25 mileage.

The Fusion received a facelift for the 2017 model year, which changed the front and rear styling, and again in 2019, but by 2018, Ford planned to discontinue the Fusion along with its other sedan models as Ford was shifting toward trucks, SUVs and the Mustang. As a result, model year 2020 was the final year for the Fusion in North America when production halted that July, ending all of Ford's 4-door cars in the North America. Ford sold 3,185,690 Fusions in the United States between 2005 and 2021.

I registered with Carmax, the nationwide used car selling agency. I had never worked with them before, but their site looked promising. After reading, "Many of our cars are eligible for a 24-hour test drive, and each comes with our 30-Day Money Back Guarantee," Carmax looked like a great place to find a good, used late model Fusion. I reviewed their inventory within a 250-mile radius from my home southwest of Baltimore, MD, and I decided that I wanted a 2.5L Fusion, preferably in blue with less than 30K miles. This led to many good candidates, but the pick of the litter that I was fortunate to locate was a Lightning Blue (paint code N6) 2017 Fusion SE with a black leatherette interior and a 2.5L engine. It was located in Salisbury, MD, had only 9,000 miles and was due in shortly. This was 110 miles away. I sent an email to Carmax in Salisbury indicating that I was interested, but I doubted that I

had any real chance of getting this car. With that low mileage I was convinced that ten other people would contact Carmax ahead of me to get it. But much to my surprise it was available only two days! I contacted Carmax again and paid a \$99 transfer fee to have the car delivered to the closest Carmax to me, only a few miles from my home.

I had the Vehicle Identification Number and ran a history search through Bumper, an online agency much like Carfax, and AutoCheck. No accidents or thefts were reported for this car, and there were no open recalls. This Fusion was manufactured on December 16, 2016 and shipped to Darcars Ford, 9020 Lanham Severn Rd, Lanham, MD. It was a personal use, one-owner car and bought on August 29, 2017, but it was not titled until October 12, 2017 in nearby College Park, MD, with only 12 miles on the odometer. The last reported mileage was only 8,134 miles on 4/18/2022 when Carmax in Salisbury received the car.

On April 26, the Fusion was shipped, and it arrived in Ellicott City on April 29, but this location wanted to complete one last quality check before I saw it. On May 2, my wife and I went to test drive the blue '17 Ford Fusion. We first discussed the car with our salesman, and then they drove the car around front for us to see. It was a warm and bright

spring day, and we first saw the car from a reflection in the glass door way. We then turned and walked out to see the car in the drive. It looked so amazing in the sunlight that it actually choked me up! I could not believe that a car that seemed like such a long shot was now parked in front of us waiting to be driven! We took the Fusion for a 30-minute ride, and it was smooth and seemed very refined. Its black leatherette interior was comfortable and flawless, and the car was quiet on the interstates. We drove the Fusion back with less than 8,200 miles and completed the paper work. The sale came with a 90-days or 4,000 miles limited warranty, although I added a longer warranty, and a few hours later this beautiful car was parked in our driveway!

I decided to give the Fusion to my mechanic for a day and asked him look the car over completely. In the event that something major was wrong, I needed to know within the first 30-days in the event so the car could to be taken back. I also wanted to zero out its maintenance, along with an oil change and a new battery. I had ordered a replacement Motorcraft battery as I could not tell how old the one was that came with the car. If it was the original, it may not have too much life left. Fortunately, my Fusion passed all of the tests!

Over the next few weeks, I had more time to inspect my car carefully to see what minor repairs or improvements were needed. After all, it really was a five and a half year old car! What I found was that both of the alloy wheels on the right side had mild rim scratches from scraping curbs. I could not find the paint code for the silver-grey color of my rims, so I went to an auto parts store and picked a random bottle of Toyota Silver Sky (M) (paint code 106) touch up paint, and much to my surprise, it was a decent match! Now the wheels looked much better. Another set of emblems was ordered from Autobadgez.com to dress up the rear deck and spoiler. I bought a roll of 1/16" black pinstripe and striped both sides of my car. This was subtle and looked appropriate. I added black tag frames and painted the attaching bolts gloss black. I ordered a set of black rubber mats from the internet that matched a set I had used before.

Now I wanted to add some chrome trim, so I ordered two more sets of OEM "SE" trunk badges from

FordPartsGiant.com and placed them on the sides of my front fenders. Finally, I went on the Autobadgez.com site and ordered two sets of 3/4" tall, italics "2.5L" badges, and one set of "I4" for the trunk to contrast the blue paint and dress up the exterior more. All of these appearance mods made my Fusion look better.

After owning my Fusion for several weeks, I have found it to be an incredibly nice running car and a joy to

own and drive. It is very quiet and the power seems more than adequate. It also has several very clever features. One is its rotary controlled automatic transmission dial on the center console. I just turn the knob and select the gear I want. One unique aspect with this dial is that if I am sitting still and open the door, the dial will automatically shift into Park. I will have to reset the knob to get back into Drive or Reverse. If I get out of the car with the engine running, the horn honks to remind me that the motor is still on! If I sit in the car for longer than 20-30 minutes with the engine idling, the engine turns itself off. All of this is very well thought out.

Finally, I can see where my '17 Fusion may have the potential to be taken to a few car shows. If it were clean and a show came along where I may be hesitant to take my Mustang because of marginal weather or other circumstances, and if the Fusion would fit into one of the classes, then rather than not go, taking the Fusion may not be a bad idea. When a show flyer says they welcome "all makes, models and years," or "rain or shine," my Fusion may get the call!

TRACK DAY HEAT #2

y father and I have essentially taken a stock 4.6L GT and built a budget GT500 over five years. Modifications over that time included: Tremec T56 Magnum six-speed transmission, aluminum driveshaft, Ford Racing Hot Rod Cams, Ford Racing Adjustable Suspension, 4 Piston Brembo Brakes, and a GT450 Department of Boost supercharger kit.

My first track experience was at Pocono Raceway through the prior year Team Shelby event, which I heard about through fellow GSRMC member Bill Chernack. This year's track day offered the same class choices as last year. Continuing my dive into track days, I signed up for the 2022 Team Shelby East Coast Grand Nationals, this time moving up to the Novice class. To qualify and participate, I bought a certified helmet and hoped for the weather to hold out in early June. This time, I was lucky enough to have an instructor available and he accompanied me for three out of four sessions, one of which was in the rain. This was completely different than last year as I was mic'd up this time and he could talk me through the course, providing instruction and criticism along the way.

It was a real benefit to have an instructor provide feedback, especially since he had 20 years' experience and brought his own Nissan GTR to the event. While I don't claim to be a professional or even a good driver, my instructor kept yelling at me for looking in the rearview mirrors (especially in non-passing zones). The feedback was clear — in non-passing

zones, there's nothing you can do about the car behind you, so don't pay them any mind and focus on your inputs/racing line. Now that I was permitted to pass (and be passed), I could stretch my car's legs a bit and attain a higher top speed, usually around 115-120 MPH. While my 450HP GT isn't too shabby, there were a good number of new GT500s, pushing over 750HP and they would leave me in the dust on the long straight. However, I did feel my car had a sufficient amount of power as I was able



to go to 6K RPM using full throttle in 3rd/4th gear on the main straight. For my last session of the day, they grouped the Novice Solo and Instructor groups together, all while extending the session to 30 minutes instead of 20. This was a great opportunity to run a dry track and space myself out from others, all without an instructor riding shotgun. I tried my best to put his teachings to practice and make the most of this session without any training wheels. I was a little too ambitious as I reached 130MPH the last couple laps and only had a smidge of brakes left when I pulled into the garages. I had found the top speed

and brake system limit but had a fantastic (and safe) time doing so.

While the track day was the event's first portion, the other days were full of activities, including a poker run, auction events, and Ford/Shelby guest speakers. Despite having a normal GT in a Team Shelby event, I would encourage all to consider the event or even just one of

the days. Due to the sheer magnitude of enjoyment I had at Pocono, I'm now hooked on tracking my car and getting the satisfaction from using all those modifications in a safe environment. We bought these cars for a reason and the track allows you to exercise them as little or as much as you're comfortable with. Spending the weekend with fellow Mustang/Ford enthusiasts and seeing all the cars at Carlisle is something to remember. I'll be attending next year and I hope to see you at the track!
