COOL CARS – NOT JUST THE COFFEE – HELP FUEL 'MUSTANG & ALL FORD MEET NJ'

oung enthusiasts are always looking for new ways to enjoy the car hobby – and sometimes a mash-up of a socially focused Cars & Coffee, an informal Cruise-In and a traditional Car Show melded into a single event can prove to be just the kind of automotive experience they are looking for. That's certainly the case with the "Mustangs & All-Ford Meet NJ," a really cool gathering that keeps growing year after year. Hosted by the same group who had started out only a few years ago as just "Cars & Coffee NJ," the Mustangs & All Ford Meet NJ has now become one of the top annual attractions in the region, thanks to sponsorship from Freehold Ford in central New Jersey, promotion and participation from Ford Performance, and enthusiastic support from our friends in the Garden State

Region Mustang Club and South Jersey Mustang Club, as well as several Facebook groups in the area.

To top off a fall weekend, what can be better than rolling in to a Sunday morning Ford-centric gettogether that offered lots of great cars and attractions but got you back out on the road by noon? Exactly. Better still, even though it's billed as New Jersey's largest All-Ford event,

there's no cost to participate. You heard right – there's even complimentary coffee and donuts, multiple door-prize giveaways with no raffle tickets to buy, free spectator admission, a free Mustang poster giveaway from Ford Performance, plus a few special awards and even a nocharge tour of a spectacular on-site private Mustang



collection. This year's meet, held on the second Sunday in September in Millstone Township, New Jersey, drew nearly 400 Ford-powered vehicles despite some morning sprinkles, and featured talks from two special guests: former editor of Muscle Mustangs & Fast Fords Evan J. Smith (now

known as "REVan Evan" on YouTube) and auto journalist/author/columnist John M. Clor, who is the Enthusiast Communications Manager for Ford Performance. Both spoke to a big crowd in an adjacent warehouse that featured lots of Mustang stories and a lively Q&A session afterward.

Longtime friend and Ford super-collector Dave Wasenda

hosts this event and invites all to check out the event website, "Mustang & All Ford Meet NJ" for more pics and a video, plus info on the event.

ars & Coffee events like the All-Ford Meet covered elsewhere in this issue have proven to be very popular, as they last a couple of hours and then everybody moves on to other things. When Paul Ritter, owner of Brook Hollow Winery, contacted us in mid-October about a possible event at his Columbia facility, we needed something that we could put together in a short period of time because it was late in the season.



Using Cars & Coffee as a model, some quick thinking, and calendar checking, Mustangs & Merlot was born. Other than a winery tour in the mid-nineties, the club had never pursued any other winery events. What could it hurt to see if enough members would be interested to make this event worthwhile. An email was sent out and people couldn't respond quick enough, why had we waited so long?

Even though the car season was winding down, there were still some events to work around but November

13th became the date for the first ever M & M event. Hmmm, that makes me think that an event revolving around the other M&Ms might be just as popular, maybe next year. Once the date was set, the plans were made.

To take advantage of the great driving weather that autumn provides, a cruise was envisioned to precede the event. Ben Ashmore agreed to set up a tour of the countryside leading to Brook Hollow Winery. We were to meet at the Mount Olive Cracker Barrel/Dunkin' Donuts and were provided a police escort to get our journey going.

We can only control so many things, and weather isn't one of them. The day dawned cool & cloudy with rain a definite possibility. Despite the dreary day, fourteen Mustangs lined the DD parking lot that morning. Add in three Ford SUVs and double the amount of people and it was a great turnout. Thanks to limited traffic, the

group was able to stay together but Ben had made everyone a detailed route map with all the directions. As we wound our way through western NJ, we came across Swartswood State Park and decided to stop for some group photos. Established in 1914 as New Jersey's first State Park Swartswood features a lake for in-season swimming & fishing and most importantly restrooms.

We then continued a short distance to Brook Hollow in Columbia. When we got there, we were met by more GSRMC members for a total of 17 Members' Mustangs that were joined by several other Mustangs and collector vehicles including the owner Paul's 2007 GT500.





We went inside the rustic winery and partook in all the winery had to offer. Amidst the conversation and drinking among club members, there was an acoustic performer singing covers.

After everyone finished drinking responsibly, some members headed home while others went out for an early dinner and still others stayed all night and had to call a cab. What a great day and way to spend a late fall day with Mustangs and their owners.

Our thanks to Paul Ritter (He's now a fellow GSRMC member.) for the invitation to his winery, which led to this great event. He has offered his facility for a future event so we'll see how we can work that into our 2023 schedule. FINE FOXES

The 15-car Newcombe Collection features 10 Fox-body 5.0 Mustangs

Newcombe fondly recall riding to church every Sunday in the back seat of the 1965 Mustang that had been purchased new by Marilyn's father. Today, Kenny admits that the couple was also influenced by the TV series "Route 66," which led them to dream about acquiring a Corvette when their kids got older. However, at 6-feet, 4-inches, Kenny wasn't a good fit for the two-seater Chevrolet sports car.

So, instead, in 1990, they reached deep into their dating-days memories to purchase their first Mustang, a 1965 convertible, followed by a 1966 hardtop for Marilyn. After refurbishing both Mustangs for Mustang Club of America concours shows, the Newcombes dove headfirst



into the Mustang community,

becoming heavily involved in the MCA by showing their Mustangs around the country and eventually joining the national

organization's leadership. Kenny served as vice president; Marilyn was elected to the board of directors and spent six years as the MCA's office manager.

When their oldest daughter needed reliable transportation for college, the Newcombes turned to the then-new Fox-body Mustang—the car that had reignited America's passion for Mustang performance. However, "I wouldn't let her have a 5.0L," Kenny said, while noting that

the college-car was a 4-cylinder. "But I saw a Summer Edition 5.0 convertible on the sales lot and returned later to buy it for myself."

The two transactions realigned the Newcombe's focus from vintage Mustangs to Fox-bodies. They soon bought another Fox-body.

Then another. Over the next 30 years, the couple put together a 26-car collection that included Ford's best 5.0 Mustangs from the early 1990s. "It was like



seeing a cute little dog," Kenny said. "We'd say, 'Can we keep it?"

Although they sold a few cars previously, including a 1969 Shelby GT500 and 428 Cobra Jet Mach 1, the Newcombes have decided to seriously downsize, choosing Mecum Kissimmee to offer 15 vehicles—anchored by 10 5.0L Mustangs from 1990-93—from their three-plus decades of collecting.

The final years of the 5.0 Mustang are considered by many to be the best of the 15-year Fox-body generation. Both body styles of the 1993 GT are represented in the Newcombe Collection, a blue and argent hatchback refurbished in 2010 and a Vibrant Red convertible equipped with some of the popular modifications of its era. The nofrills LX 5.0s are also represented with a black convertible with legendary Flowmaster exhaust and a high-performance cam, as well as a 33,000-mile hatchback powered by a Vortech-supercharged 347 stroker V-8 with Trick Flow heads and many other aftermarket upgrades. Kenny says he has driven the Vibrant Red hatchback to a 10.2-second, 122 MPH quarter-mile ET on the drag strip.

In the final years of the Mustang Fox-body era, Ford created special editions to pump up excitement. The Newcombe Collection showcases five, starting with a 35,000-mile 1990 "7UP" Edition, one of 4,103 produced in Dark Emerald Jewel Green following a canceled giveaway promotion with the soft-drink maker. A 17,570-mile 1992 Summer Edition convertible is an excellent example of

Ford's first Mustang "feature car," identified by its monochromatic red paint, chrome five-star wheels and unique rear spoiler. Three monochromatic Feature Car convertibles from 1993 are also part of the Newcombe offering: two in yellow—one with

15,822 miles and the other with 66,244—and an attractive "triple white" model with only 1,220 miles.

A Mustang Fox collection wouldn't be complete without a 1993 Cobra from Ford's Special Vehicle Team. As one of the first vehicles from SVT, the Cobra put the exclamation mark on the Fox-body era by taking advantage of Ford's GT40 cylinder heads, special intake manifold and more aggressive camshaft for 235 HP, the most for a production 5.0 Mustang. Acquired from the first owner, the Newcombe Cobra is an original California car and one of 4.993 built. Three colors were available: the Newcombe Cobra is one of only 1,355 in Teal. Paired with the Cobra is the other 1993 vehicle from SVT, a red Lightning pickup with 49,100 miles and the only non-Mustang in the Newcombe grouping. As Ford's first entry into the sport truck market, Ford packed the Lightning with a 5.8L/240 HP V-8 equipped with GT40 heads, tubular intake and headers. Newcombe utilized this Lightning as a tow truck when transporting Mustangs to MCA shows.

Although the original Fox-body era ended in 1993, its legacy continued into the 1994-2004 models, which were restyled on a new SN95 chassis that was basically a reengineered and stouter version of the Fox-body. So it's no surprise that the Newcombes added two of the best to their collection. Ordered new by Marilyn and currently showing 11,386 miles, the Chrome Yellow 1998 Cobra convertible is one of 3,480 produced with the Cobra-only 4.6L DOHC, a



high-winding V-8 that generates 305 HP. From the end of the SN95 era, the Newcombes couldn't resist adding an Azure Blue Mach 1, also powered by the 305 HP DOHC but equipped with a functional Shaker hood scoop that pokes through the hood in a flashback to the 1969-70 muscle car era. The Mach 1 is essentially brand new with only 1,797 miles.

The only pre-1990 Mustang in the Newcombe offering is a good one—a 1966 Shelby GT350H that Kenny "won" while casually bidding on an online auction. One of 999 produced by Shelby American for Hertz's Sports Car Club, the 69,523-mile, black-with-gold former rental car is powered by a matching-numbers 289 Cobra HiPo engine. Paired with the first-gen GT350H is a 2006 Shelby GT-H, also black with gold stripes and one of 500 produced by then-Shelby Automobiles to commemorate the 40th anniversary of the original from 1966. A 21,350-mile car, the GT-H is No. 79 from that production run and was originally rented at the Tampa, Florida, airport. Both Hertz



Shelbys feature Carroll Shelby' signature on the dash, and both have been commonly displayed together at shows by the Newcombes.

For the Newcombes, the bittersweet time has come to downsize their collection while retaining a few personal favorites for cruising and showing. The sale of the Newcombe Collection at Mecum's Kissimmee Auction in January 2023 provides a great opportunity for others to take over as caregivers for a group of 14 well-preserved late-model Mustangs and one performance pickup, all meticulously and personally maintained by Kenny and Marilyn in climate-controlled storage. For 5.0 Mustang fans in particular, the Newcombe Collection offers a chance to acquire some of the best from the Mustang's legendary Foxbody era.
