TWELVE-YEAR-OLD CAR Part two of a three-part story.

Carvana on Monday, January 23, 2023, I had seven days to either keep the car or return it for a refund. As such, I planned to take the car to my body shop for an evaluation on that Tuesday, and on Wednesday it would go to my mechanic for a review. I wanted people I trusted to tell me if this Mustang was a keeper. When my wife and I saw the car, our first task was to have it pass the "sniff" test. I have a limited sense of smell because of surgery years ago. With this Mustang, we first test drove it together, and it passed the "sniff" test easily. Whew!

Our next step was a walk-around to look at the car's condition. It rained that day, and the Mustang was sitting outside and not in the famous glass vending machine that Carvana advertises. The car looked like it had not been washed recently, and its tires had that brownish-look needing tire prep. The good news, though, was that the website showed three small paint damage areas. One was

possible chipped paint on the front bumper, the next was scratches over the right rear wheel, and the third was a lightly scuffed area over the left rear wheel. But when I looked, the first two were gone, and only the left rear still had minor scuffs that possibly could be buffed out.

The engine was minimally cleaned, but everything looked like it was in original condition. The interior was better. When I inspected the trunk, there was no

spare tire! The salesperson said that this Mustang came with a factory portable tire sealant and compressor kit (Ford part number AG1Z-19L523-A) instead of a real spare tire. I had never heard of this. Finally, I looked at the inside lip under the front hood that my body shop had warned about to check for rust blistering through the paint, and sure enough, this Mustang had that problem all along the underside. It was hard to see, but I felt the raised areas.

After that I took the Mustang on another short test ride alone. The only negative was that there was an

annoying, buzzing rattle somewhere in the center console or dash. Hopefully I could correct that. I decided that I would buy this car knowing that I had only four more weekdays to have it evaluated by trusted friends, and either keep or return it. The clock was ticking louder! My wife and I left for the 45-minute drive home, but when we were 15 minutes away, a rock hit the right side of my windshield leaving a nasty chip. Ouch! After hearing that annoying crack! sound I hoped I would not have to add a new windshield. Later I tried to seal it, but it was still visible. What luck!

On Tuesday, I took the Mustang to my body shop to discuss it with their manager. He said that the only visible damage was the left rear scuff. The other two areas may have been buffed. We then reviewed the bubbling under the hood. The shop would remove the hood, grind the rusted areas, reseal everything, and then repaint the front underside. This should correct the problem for years to come. Overall, there were no signs that the Mustang had prior damage.

The hood repair was completed two weeks later when the shop removed the hood and ground the rust out of the front and applied seam sealer. They also went inside the hood and applied cavity wax to minimize new rust. They then resprayed the underside of the hood blue. The shop also buffed the clearcoat on the left rear scuff. About a week later,

however, I found a new quarterinch square blistering area in the paint on the outside of my hood. I contacted the shop again to repair this, which required repainting the entire outer hood. Hopefully this was the last paint repair!

At this time, I decided to have Safelite install a new windshield on the following Monday. It was not however, a Carlite, with the pony outline hidden in the grey area. The price

difference was an additional \$180 for the pony "branding," and I could not justify that expense with everything I planned. Oh, well!

On Wednesday, I gave the Mustang to my mechanic to look over, as well as complete an oil change and other servicing. I asked him to find fault with anything that needed attention before I made my final decision on keeping this car. I also asked him to try to find that awful buzzing rattle as that was feeling like a deal-breaker. Later he said that everything checked out, but he never heard the rattle. He test drove the

Mustang on the roads near his shop that are relatively smooth, and possibly drove in the rain, but he never heard anything. My heart sank into my shoes. We agreed that I would bring the Mustang back if the problem was still there.

On Thursday, I decided that I did not want the factory tire sealant and compressor kit in my trunk. This was a complicated way to move a car with a flat tire to a shop, whereas using a real spare tire seemed easier. My first problem, though, was that I had 18" tires, and I could not find a matching 18" spare, only 17". After researching, the consensus was that a 17" spare tire was acceptable if not driven over 50mph or used for more than 50 miles. Years ago, Ford made a spare tire kit for the 2011 Mustangs, but no one had them, and so I found salvage yards that sold used 17" spare tire kits from older Mustang wrecks. I located a set with a spare tire and rim, a jack assembly, a tire iron, a j-bolt,

a hold-down washer, a wing nut, and a tool roll on eBay. This was the equipment that should have been added to my nicely equipped Mustang.

The kit arrived in good condition. I first inflated the tire to 60 PSI as it stated on its side. I next made a paper mockup of the rim's bolt pattern to be sure that the spare matched the rims

on my Mustang. Next the spare tire and rim and the j-bolt looked reasonably new. So did the jack, wing nut and tool roll, but they were used. The tire iron looked good, but it had brown mud inside that needed cleaning! The hold-down washer was crusty and was replaced. I removed the factory compressor kit and tried to add the used spare tire assembly. I could not figure out the sequence for installing these parts, and fortunately I found two pictures on the web and an exploded drawing. I noticed that I was missing two pieces, a jack stowage bolt that holds the jack under the spare, and a nut-wing, a plastic cap-like fitting, and I ordered them.

When they arrived, I first rechecked the tire pressure, and it was still at 60 PSI, so I had a good spare. I then added a complete spare tire assembly into my trunk. Earlier I had noticed that the painted metal "shelf" that was behind my spare tire's well looked like someone had spilled a brown liquid causing minor paint bubbling. I cleaned that as best I could, but I also asked my body shop to look at it. The shop used a special cleaner, but it would not touch the

spill. The good news, however, was that there were no signs of rust, and the area is hidden under the trunk cover. The final step was adding aftermarket carpeting, which had no logo as none were available.

By Friday of the first week, I was on my last day to either keep the Mustang or return it, but the buzzing rattle in the interior was still the last hurdle to get over. I asked my mechanic if we could road test the car that afternoon for one last attempt at locating the noise. We drove to the Baltimore Washington Parkway, which is notorious for raised seams about every 100'. The buzzing rattle came through loud and clear. My mechanic then pressed on panels in the interior, but nothing worked. He said that we could open the dash and put it back together, but probably not find anything. And then, out of the blue, my mechanic pressed on the side of my rearview mirror...and the buzzing...stopped! We looked at each other in disbelief. Can you believe it? It now seemed like I would keep the Mustang after all! We decided that I

would ask Safelite to adjust the mirror to stop the noise when the new windshield was installed. If that did not work, I would order a new rearview mirror.

On Monday, January 30, I drove to Safelite. My technician had 19 years at this location. I asked him to try to correct the noise when he added my new glass. An hour later he explained that from his experience, some Mustangs and Ford Explorers, too, as well as some Jeeps, over

time develop sealant problems with their windshields that allows air to buffet the glass, and this makes their rearview mirrors rattle. By installing new glass, the seal is made new, and the mirror stops buzzing.

Although he tightened the bracket inside my mirror before reinstalling, the problem was not there. It was in the old sealant that allowed high speed air to buffet the glass. I never would have guessed this! I drove home 8-10 miles at speeds over 60mph, and everything was quiet. Just amazing! In the weeks that followed everything stayed quiet. I guess my decision to replace my windshield was not a bad idea after all, and that rock that hit my glass was a blessing in disguise!

With all the initial debugging now completed, the next phase was preparing for upgrades to improve my Mustang's appearance!
